#### **CURRENT ISSUES**

Kidney transplantation (KT) is considered the best treatment option for chronic kidney disease, which affects about 3 million Canadians (1). However, ethnic minority populations in Canada face significant barriers in accessing KT.

- African Canadian, East Asian, and South Asian patients are 65%, 73%, and 57% less likely than Caucasian patients to receive a living donor KT, respectively<sup>(2)</sup>
- South Asian and Muslim patients are less than half as likely to receive an offer for living donation compared to Caucasian, non-Muslim patients<sup>(3)</sup>
- African and East Asian patients are significantly less likely to have a potential living donor identified at first evaluation than Caucasian patients<sup>(2)</sup>

Currently, there is limited research that exists to help us understand what prevents patients belonging to ethnic minority groups from pursuing KT.

#### **OUR APPROACH**

We aim to develop a culturally competent and religiously sensitive kidney health education guide for South Asian, East Asian, Black, African, Afro-Caribbean, and Muslim communities in order to improve transplant knowledge and enhance access to KT.

#### **RESEARCH PHASES**

#### 1. Environmental Scan

Review of current kidney educational programs and resources available to various ethnic and religious minority communities in Canada.

#### 2. Knowledge Assessment and Ethno-Cultural Barriers Analysis

Administration of focus groups and surveys to understand the specific ethno-cultural barriers as well as any concerns raised by the community.

#### 3. Education Toolkit Development

Development of the kidney health education guide regarding deceased and living donor kidney transplantation.

#### 4. Assessment and Distribution of Toolkits

Assessment of transplant-related knowledge before and after receiving information from the tailored education guide.
